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F3C/F3N World Cup Report 2024

In 2024 only World Cups in the class F3C took place. No organizers were found who wanted to host a World Cup for F3N.

1. F3C

In total 5 competitions were on the FAI calendar, but only 4 competitions took place. The competition in Germany had to be cancelled due to insufficient number of participants. Thus, the minimum number of competitions to participate in the awarding ceremony, which is five, was not reached.

The first competitions was held in France, followed by Austria, Switzerland and the Netherlands.

World Cup competitions have only taken place in Europe.

No protests in any competition are known.

All participants were in possession of a FAI licence.

At all World Cups competitions three P schedules (preliminary) and two F schedules (final) should be flown. This was possible at all World Cups due to good or acceptable weather conditions.
